Remembered in Time not lost in Time

For over 45 years, the F-100 served America.



as the premier front-line fighter, with abilities no other airplane possessed;

as one of the main stalwarts of the Cold War—sitting nuclear alert across the world;

as the tactical workhorse during the Vietnam War, flying more sorties than all of the P-51s of World War II, and more than all other fighter aircraft in the Vietnam War combined. The "Hun" also served four Allied Nations - France, Denmark, Turkey and Nationalist China - as well as most of the American Air National Guard.

The FSS website has a complete list of F-100s on display in parks, playgrounds, museums and along roadsides, "still keeping vigilance, often forgotten by those that she protected, but not by those that flew her". The F-100 and those who served with her are quietly "flying west" in alarming numbers.

OUR GOAL

The goal of the Friends of the Super Sabre in partnership with the Super Sabre Society and MAPS Air Museum is to preserve the legacy of one of the more formidable warriors of the Cold War and Vietnam.

North American Aviation F-100 Super Sabre

- 1953 First aircraft to exceed supersonic speed (Mach 1.0) in level flight.
- 1954 479th FDS, George Air Force Base, California becomes the first F-100 squadron.
- 1954 Collier Trophy under President Eisenhower.
- 1955 Bendix Trophy— Colonel Carlos Talbot.
- 1956 First tactical jet non-stop deployment to Europe.
- 1956 Chosen aircraft of the United States Air Force Thunderbirds for 13 years.
- 1957 First tactical jet non-stop deployment to the Pacific.
- 1957 First Air National Guard unit equipped with supersonic fighters–New Mexico Air National Guard.
- 1958 First jet to make a zero length launch.
